# **Early Spring & Your Yard**

According Walter to seasonal calendar, now is the time to sharpen your lawn mower blade or replace it with a new one so you'll be ready to cut that grass when you wake up and find it's grown half a foot overnight! He also recommends checking camellia leaves for scale insects and removing their spent blooms from the bush and from the ground to prevent petal blight. Fertilize shrubs and plant your dahlias, caladiums, elephant ears. And, it is never the wrong time to lime your lawn; 40 pounds per 1000 sq. ft. is usually enough but he recommends a soil test to be sure. (walterreeves.com)

If you'd like to have your soil tested, soil samples may be brought to the Cooperative Extension office (located at the Gwinnett Government Annex Building at 750 S. Perry Street, Suite 400 in Lawrenceville) in a plastic or paper bag. The soil must be completely dry before bringing it in. It takes about 2 cups of soil mixed together from several areas all over your testing plot to make one sample. Put all the soil in one bag. The cost for the basic soil test is \$8.00, and takes about 10 to 12 days for results. If you need more info on taking a soil test, call 678.377.4010 or email: extensionservice@gwinnettcounty.com

# **No Parking on the Street**

Please remember that our covenants don't allow street parking other than for very brief periods of time. We've heard numerous complaints lately, and given the poor visibility on our curvy and hilly streets, coupled with lack of sidewalks, school kids, and bus stops, it's just not safe. Please park in your garage.

## **Burning ban back May 1**

Throughout April, you can burn yard debris outdoors if you abide by the Gwinnett Fire Marshal regulations:

- Never leave fire unattended.
- No burning when there is fog, rain, or anytime wind is predicted to be, or is, more than 15 mph.
- No burning for one day after a cold front passes through.
- No burning after dark or on Sundays.
- No burning within 20 feet of flammable, combustible, or explosive materials.
- No burning of any materials that emit a heavy dark smoke, such as rubber products, roofing materials, petroleum based products, etc.
- No burning of solid waste or household trash.

The Fire Marshal may declare other days unsafe for burning. Call the burn hotline after 9 a.m. each day to find out if burning is allowed that day: 678 518-4979. If someone is burning improperly, call 770 513-5700 or 911.
