Local Lilburn Roadway Improvements

The Feb. 24th Citizen's Project Selections Committee (CPSC) meeting approved the budget recommendation to spend \$2M on intersection improvements for Hasty Court and Five Forks Trickum adding left turn lanes from Five Forks Trickum Rd into Hasty Acres and the new Amberleaf subdivision. Also included in the CPSC recommendation was an \$1.5M additional for improvements to the Oleander Five Forks Trickum and intersection. Both are funded from the 2017 SPLOST budget by Gwinnett County DOT. These two projects join the existing countyapproved expenditure for the addition of a middle turn lane on Five Forks Trickum Rd from Tom Smith Rd. north to Oak Rd. Both

projects are in response to the added traffic of the new housing developments Amberleaf and the as-yet unbuilt Oleander development.

As we've previously reported both these developments were vocallv public opposed at hearings by local HOAs. They were approved by District 2 Commissioner Lynnette Howard despite the strong opposition. A major reason for the opposition to these developments was the already crowded roadways and there were suggestions that those developers should for pay roadway upgrades.

Throughout April, you can burn yard debris outdoors if you abide by the Gwinnett Fire Marshal regulations, a selection of which is below:

 Never leave an outdoor fire unattended

• No burning is permitted when there is fog, rain, or a cloud base that is diffused or ill defined. You also must wait at least one day following the passage of a cold front before burning

• No burning of solid waste or household garbage is allowed

• No burning of any materials that emit a heavy dark smoke, such as rubber products, oils, roofing material, petroleum based products, etc.

• No burning when smoke presents a health hazard to persons in the vicinity of the fire. The Fire Marshal's Office is authorized to ban outdoor burning in a limited geographical area upon receipt of medical certification from a resident if they have a medical condition that is adversely affected by smoke

• No burning shall be conducted within 20 feet of flammable, combustible, or explosive materials

Pet Owners: Clean up Poop!

There have been numerous complaints about people who let their pets poop in others' yards and not cleaned it up. The pet owner is responsible for removing waste left by their pet, whether in the street or in a yard. Don't be a crappy neighbor – pick up after your pet!

• No burning on Sundays or nights. Compliant bonfires, cooking fires, and recreational fires in chimneas and outdoor replaces may be burned on Sunday and at night provided all other criteria and restrictions are applied

The Fire Marshal may declare other days unsafe for burning. Call the burn hotline after 9 a.m. each day to find out if burning is allowed that day: 678.518.4979. If someone is burning improperly, call 770.513.5700 or 911.
