This year, luminaries supplies will be distributed on Sunday, Dec 15 between 1 and 5 p.m. at 4015 Windhurst. At that time, you can also drop off your dues of \$60 for 2020 and make donations to defray the cost of the luminary supplies and to benefit our local firehouse.

If you won't be home for the pickup or the lightings, please ask a neighbor to do it for you. Most people are happy to oblige. If you are picking up luminary supplies for your neighbor, you can add their name and phone number to the drawing box.

Everyone who picks up and lights luminaries by 6 p.m. qualifies for the drawing for a \$50 gift card.

following Sunday, Dec 22, as the rain date for setting out and lighting the luminaries. Supplies collection, dues, and donations are all on Dec 15, regardless of the weather.

Prepare for luminaries by clearing leaves and debris out of the rain gutters by the roadside – taking care that the leaves don't end up down the storm drains, where they can block or slow down water flow. Even worse, the twigs, leaf litter, and dirt can settle into ridges that cause little pools in the drain culvert. We most definitely don't want to create standing water for mosquito breeding!

We'll also have a group of volunteers to fill in spaces along Deerbrook, but please don't make us work too hard. Get your luminaries and join in!

Waste Pro Late Pickups

Waste Pro is contracted with the county, which bills us for their services. Lately they have several times been late for their usual Wednesday routes, picking up trash or recycling a day late. If this occurs, the homeowner should report it early the next morning to the county at 770-822-7141 if Waste Pro

doesn't pick up either their trash or their recycling on Wednesday. You can also call Waste Pro directly at 770-451-9395, but the county will usually get action faster. You can also use that number to request a covered rolling recycling bin at no charge.
